







## **LPA Summary: SA Budget 2019-20**

Dear Member,

As Members may be aware, the South Australian (SA) State Budget 2019-20 was handed down yesterday (18 June).

The SA Budget included the following new investments in the live performance sector and arts more broadly:

- \$3.8m over three years to support the Adelaide Festival to continue to attract major performances and events.
- \$2.6m over two years for an upgrade to the Aboriginal Cultural Collection storage facility, which holds items of immeasurable cultural significance.
- \$500,000 in 2019-20 to finalise the design and ongoing operating model for the Aboriginal Art and Cultures Gallery at Lot Fourteen, in consultation with key stakeholders. This is in addition to already announced Commonwealth and state funding of \$150 million to facilitate the construction of the Aboriginal Art and Cultures Gallery as a national centrepiece of contemporary and historical Aboriginal art.

The SA Government increased the payroll tax-free threshold to \$1.5m from 1 January 2019. Businesses with national wages above \$1.5 million receive a deduction of \$600,000. This measure is intended to provide significant payroll tax relief, to support small and medium-sized businesses to grow and create jobs.
