<p><b>How many people can attend?</b></p> <p><b>INDOOR</b></p> <p><a href="#">One person per 4 square metres</a> (excluding staff), <b>OR</b> <b>50% capacity of the venue</b> (to a maximum of 1000 persons including children), <b>whichever is the greater.</b></p> <p>Create NSW has advised that you can submit exemption requests for events (including for those events planned for post-December 2020). More information can be found <a href="#">here</a>.</p> <p><b>OUTDOOR</b></p> <p><b>500 people</b> can attend an <a href="#">outdoor seated music performance</a>, <b>subject to the 4sqm rule.</b></p> <p>People must be seated during the performance.</p> <p>On 19 November 2020, the New South Wales Government <a href="#">announced</a> the easing of some density restrictions from <b>23 November 2020</b> for outdoor events ahead of the festive season:</p> <p><b>Increased capacity for</b></p>	<p><b>How many people can attend?</b></p> <p><b>INDOOR</b></p> <p>Indoor entertainment venues, including cinemas and theatres, can open to a <b>maximum of 20 people per space and a 1.5m distance between groups</b> with a maximum of 10 people per booking.</p> <p>Performance or screening times must be staggered, with at least a 30-minute interval between sessions to avoid crowds in foyers and bathrooms.</p> <p>For live music performances and rehearsals, a physical distance of two metres is required between performers, and a distance of five metres must be maintained between performers and the audience. Performers are excluded from venues caps. There should be no more than five people singing or using</p>	<p><b>How many people can attend?</b></p> <p><b>INDOOR</b></p> <p><b>One person per 2 square metres or up to 100% of seated venue capacity at ticketed events with patrons in allocated seating</b> (e.g. theatre, live music, cinemas and sports). Children and babies also count towards the maximum number.</b></p>	<p><b>How many people can attend?</b></p> <p><b>INDOOR and OUTDOOR</b></p> <p>Large indoor performance venues (with forward-facing and mostly fixed seating) can have ticketed events of <b>no more than 50% capacity, up to 1,000 people</b>, provided they have a COVID Safe Plan for each specific event.</p> <p>Enclosed outdoor venues with permanent tiered seating and grandstands can <b>have no more than 50% capacity, up to 1,000 people</b>, provided they have a COVID Safe Plan for each event.</p> <p>GIO Stadium and Manuka Oval can have <b>no more than 50% capacity</b> with an appropriate COVID Safe Plan in place for each event.</p> <p><b>Cinemas and movie theatres can sell up to 50% capacity of each theatre</b> (in accordance with new gathering restrictions).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><b>One person per four square metres of usable space in each indoor space (excluding staff)</b></li> </ul>	<p><b>How many people can attend?</b></p> <p><b>INDOOR and OUTDOOR</b></p> <p>Patrons can attend any cinema or theatre, concert hall, music hall, dance hall, nightclub, amusement venue, any other similar entertainment venue, as well as any arena, stadium, sporting facility including community and sporting competitions, with spectators seated in accordance with their approved COVID-19 Event Safety Plan.</p> <p>A <b>minimum distance of 1.5 metres</b> should be maintained at all times between individuals who are not family contacts or part of the same household.</p> <p>Physical distancing and hygiene principles should be considered and implemented.</p>

<p><b>outdoors singing and carols:</b></p> <p>Up to 30 singers will be permitted outdoors, subject to COVID-safe requirements (the limit of 5 remains for indoor venues).
