PUBLIC EVENTS

Public Events may occur in accordance with the Public Events Framework (PEF). Organisers may apply for a Public Event to be considered under the PEF.

o Tier 1: highly complex and involving more than 5,000 attendees
- submit a COVIDSafe Event Plan to the Victorian Government for public health approval
- submit a COVIDSafe Event Plan at least 8-10 weeks prior to the event

o Tier 2: moderately complex involving 1000-5,000 attendees
- submit a COVIDSafe Event Plan to the Victorian Government for public health approval
- submit a COVIDSafe Event Plan at least 4-6
