They must complete the declaration form:

- either 24 hours before they enter NSW or on entry
- whether they cross the border by any means including air, road or rail
- each time they enter NSW, but not more than once per calendar day.

If a traveller has been to an <u>area of high concern</u>, they:

- may only enter NSW if a NSW resident
- may not transit through NSW
- must immediately <u>get</u> <u>tested</u> and <u>self-isolate</u>.

If a traveller has been to a <u>Category A area of high</u> <u>concern</u> (close contact venues) at the date and time on which **Zone** the traveller is entering the state.

Green Zone:

 must apply for a permit to enter Victoria.

Orange Zone:

- must apply for a permit to enter Victoria
- must get a COVID-19 test within 72 hours and isolate until returning a negative result
- a permit will not be issued if travellers have:
- COVID-19 symptoms, or
- have visited a red zone (unless for purpose of transit)

Red Zone:

 anyone who has been in a red zone in the last 14 days will not be allowed to enter Victoria without a <u>permitted worker</u> <u>permit</u> or exemption. days or since the start date for the hotspot (whichever is shorter) will not be allowed to enter Queensland, except for essential purposes.

Travellers who are permitted to enter Queensland who have been in a COVID-19 hotspot within the last 14 days or since the start date for the hotspot (whichever is shorter) must quarantine for 14 days at government arranged accommodation.

Queensland residents who have been in a COVID-19 hotspot can return home by air.

- submit to COVID-19 testing on day 1, 5 and 13
- must comply with the self-quarantine requirements until they get a negative COVID-19 test result
- not enter or remain in a high risk setting in South Australia for a period of 14 days after their arrival in South Australia or until they get a negative COVID-19 test result
- not attend any event in South Australia with an approved COVID -19 Management Plan or at which more than 1000 people are present

Travellers are categorised based on where they have spent the last 14 days and whether the area is low, medium or high-risk.

Low Risk – ACT, NT, QLD, WA, NSW, VIC, SA, New Zealand

Medium Risk: None

High Risk: Overseas (other than New Zealand), cruise ships

Travellers who have spent time in a high-risk domestic area or premises and locations in the 14 days before arriving in Tasmania are not permitted to enter Tasmania, unless approved as an Essential Traveller.
