# COVID-19 SAFE EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES FRAMEWORK

Gatherings over 250 people indoors and 500 people outdoors may operate subject to conditions. The Framework for COVID-19 Safe Events and Activities in Tasmania outlines the requirements.

- Events over 2000 people must submit a COVID Safety Plan and require an exemption
- Exemptions can be sought by venues to host live performance events at up to three persons per four square metres (75%) of usable indoor space, subject to the event being ticketed and seated wherever practicable.

People are strongly encouraged to wear face masks at public indoor gatherings. Indoor FOH staff are also required to wear a face mask when working.
