Events with 500 to 1000 people in attendance inside a major population centre do require completion of a checklist or safety plan, COVID-19 Small Event Checklist. The organiser of the event must appoint a COVID-19 Safety Supervisor.

Event Safety Plan and receive formal approval from the Chief Health Officer prior to the event proceeding. The organiser of the event must appoint a COVID-19 Safety Supervisor.
