Significant easing of COVID-19 rules to bring SA into line with the rest of Australia

Following today's Emergency Management Council meeting, there will be further easing of South Australia's COVID-19 rules to bring SA into line with the rest of the nation.

Effective from 12:01am on Friday, 15 April 2022, the following adjustments will be made to the current settings:

- QR check-ins will only be required for hospitals, aged care and residential disability facilities;
- Masks will be required only on passenger transport (including taxis and rideshare), planes, indoors at airports, hospitals and community healthcare, residential aged care, disability care facilities and correctional service facilities.

In relation to masks in schools, we will continue to work with the Department of Education over the school holidays and make further announcements closer to the next school term.

The changes have been supported by Chief Public Health Officer Professor

Nicola Spurrier and will form the basis of directions from State Co-ordinator

Linda Williams.

In the absence of a substantial change of circumstance, South Australia also

remains on track to remove the Emergency Management Declaration on or

before 30 June.
