Smoking laws in Australia

Snapshot: Smoking and e-cigarettes in artistic performances Australia

- E-cigarettes may be used in smokefree areas if do not contain tobacco or any other herb/plant matter.
- Tobacco Products Control Regulations 2006 (Regulation 10) allows performers to smoke in enclosed public space if occupiers give consent before performance.

- Smoking and e-cigarettes (nicotine free) banned in smoke-free areas.
- Performers can smoke if, and only for as long as, it is a necessary part of the performance.



- Smoking and e-cigarettes (nicotine free) banned in smoke-free areas.
- Exemption for performers in Section 112 of the Tobacco and Other Smoking Products Act 1998.
- Allows performers to smoke in theatre or performance space if smoking is part of the performance.

- E-cigarettes (nicotine free) banned in areas where smoking is banned.
- Exemption for performers in Section 7(2) of the Smoke-Free Environment Act 2000
- Allows performers to smoke in theatre or performance space if essential to the performance.

- · E-cigarettes (nicotine free) banned in areas where smoking is banned.
- If smoking is essential, apply to Drugs and Alcohol Services SA for exemption to smoke or use e-cigarettes in a performance.
- · Apply at least 6 weeks prior to performance.

NSW	 Applicable legislation: Smoke-free Environment Act 2000 Smoking and the use of e-cigarettes (including non-nicotine) is prohibited in all enclosed public places and other smoke-free areas. This encompasses the use of e-cigarettes. A theatre can create a policy to ban smoking or e-cigarette use on their stage irrespective of this exemption. QLD	 Applicable legislation: <i>Tobacco and Other Smoking Products Act 1998.</i> Smoking and the use of e-cigarettes (including non-nicotine) is prohibited in all indoor public places and other smoke-free areas. 	 Smoking and the use of e-cigarettes (including non-nicotine) is prohibited in all enclosed public places and other smoke-free areas.

	 Smoking (including e-cigarettes and herbal cigarettes) during an artistic performance in an enclosed space is prohibited unless an exemption is granted by the Minister. Exemptions are only granted where smoking is deemed absolutely necessary to the
	 performance and all other options have been exhausted. Applications for an exemption must be submitted to Drug and Alcohol Services
	South Australia at least 6 weeks prior to the performance.

	Application form/process: <u>Tobacco laws for artistic performances SA Health</u>
	Smoking is not permitted in any enclosed public place or smoke-free area unless the Minister grants an exception.
WA	Applicable legislation: <u>Tobacco Products Control Act 2006</u> and <u>Tobacco Products</u> Control Regulations 2006
	 The Act regulates the use of tobacco products. This includes a cigarette or cigar including tobacco, or a smoking product that contains an herb or other plant matter - whether or not the product also contains tobacco.
	 It is illegal to smoke tobacco products in all enclosed public spaces and other smoke- free areas. A list of smoke-free areas can be found at: <u>Laws on smoking</u> (health.wa.gov.au)
	• However, <u>Regulation 10</u> provides an exemption that allows a performer to smoke in an enclosed public space for the purpose of a performance if occupiers gave consent before the performance commenced.
	• Currently, it is legal to use e-cigarettes in smoke-free areas if they do not contain tobacco, herbs or other plant matter.
	 However, owners/managers may choose to implement a policy applying to their premises which prohibits the use of e-cigarettes wherever smoking is prohibited.

	Smoking is not permitted in any enclosed public place or smoke-free area unless the occupiers consent.

	• The following products cannot be used in enclosed public spaces and other smoke- free areas: tobacco products, e-cigarettes, personal vaporisers, herbal cigarettes and non-tobacco cigarettes.

	 Smoking and the use of e-cigarettes (including non-nicotine) is prohibited in all enclosed public places and other smoke-free areas.

	• There are no exemptions for smoking as part of a performance. Smoking includes directly, puffing, drawing or inhaling smoke and holding or having control over any smoking product while it is ignited or vape while it is activated.

	Smoking is not permitted in any indoor public place or smoke-free area.
NT	Applicable legislation: <u>Tobacco Control Act 2002</u>
	• The legislation applies to e-cigarettes as if they were tobacco products.
